If you haven't already had the nomination form through the post then it'll be with you shortly – just remember to return it by Monday 16 May. If you don't receive one, please call 279 6932 for a form.

And don't forget that every resident in Burngreave over the age of 15 can vote in the BNDfC elections. If you vote in local or national elections, you will already be on our BNDfC electoral register. If you are not sure if you registered please complete the form that should have been delivered to your home earlier this month and send it back by 13 June.

There will be a three-week period in which to post your vote, plus an additional opportunity to vote in person at the polling station at Abbeyfield Multicultural Festival on 10 July.

Did you know?

The number of Burngreave residents who feel their quality of life is fairly or very good has increased from 72 per cent in 2002 to 79 per cent now.



Those people who are fairly or very satisfied with Burngreave as a place to live is up from 64 per cent to 71 per cent.



Growing in Confidence

A therapeutic garden project set up for people with mental health problems is blooming.

GreenFingers was launched in June 2004, and caters for adults mainly from the Burngreave New Deal for Communities area. Many also have physical disabilities.

The project now has 40 members and runs group sessions four days a week from a large wheelchair-friendly allotment plot on Grimesthorpe Road.

Helen Warburton, one of the Project Managers said: "We cater for anyone in the New Deal area who might be feeling anxious or depressed about life, as well as those who have more long-term mental illnesses.

"It's a great opportunity for people to get out of the house, get some fresh air and exercise – and receive support from other local people in similar situations." Members can try their hand at growing fresh produce, such as herbs and vegetables, which is then shared out amongst the rest of the group. They can also have a go at creating new garden designs.

Away from the allotments, day trips are also organised with members. In recent months they have been to Chatsworth House and Castleton to see the Christmas lights.

An arts course is also soon to be launched, giving people the opportunity to learn new skills.

Helen added: "GreenFingers is about more than just gardening. It acts as a stepping-stone for group members to get involved in other art and leisure activities. Each day and week is different, making it a challenging and fun experience."

Learning for Life

Local resident Rashida Hassanali wanted to give a little something back to the community she lives in and now through her role as a Community Education Co-ordinator she's seen first hand the difference learning can make...

"I am aware of how much potential there is in the community here. The thing holding people back is their lack of confidence, not recognising the skills they already have, and possibly childcare.

"My position allows me to tap into this potential for the good of the entire area, as well as the individuals concerned.

"It makes me sad to think that there's so much talent in this area – people who can sew, cook, sing, play instruments, speak numerous languages and are skilled trades people – yet this

isn't given the credence that it would get in some other places.

"But we're trying to change that and increase people's confidence as well as their skills. We run classes in different areas – personal skills such as assertiveness, work skills like ICT and office skills, English classes, activities that enable parents to help their children with their homework, health and well-being including stress management, exercise and healthy eating, as well as family learning and fun activities.

"Education is about more than academic success – life skills are incredibly important too. But we also try to help parents to understand what is going on in school and what they can do to help.

"It definitely gives me a lot of job satisfaction. It's very positive for me because I live in this community and I




can see what a difference these learning opportunities have made.

"Some of the people who were in the first classes two years ago are now working or looking for jobs in the community. They want to be involved – they're working with Sure Start, volunteering, becoming lunchtime supervisors or classroom assistants and others have gone on to further training.

"The results of adult education aren't instant but they are worth the wait."

Says Mercy: "Usually we don't pay much attention to things that come through the letterbox but I saw this leaflet and it really interested us so we decided to give them a call."

The Home Owners Maintenance and Advice Scheme aims to help people look after their home by offering a free external property survey and maintenance advice.

Leaflets about the scheme are being delivered to homes on a street-by-street basis. Once an owner-occupier in the BNDfC area has received one they can make an appointment with the surveyor who will visit the property to assess all external maintenance issues.

Free advice is given and financial assistance of up to £500 is available for any essential maintenance work identified. If the work suggested is set to cost more than £500 but the owner wants to go ahead with it all, they just pay the difference.

"We had lots of bits and bobs done to

our property from security measures, such as fitting door and window locks and adding spy holes to the doors, to painting the windows and cleaning out the gutters. It has been great," said Mercy.

"We would not even have known anything was wrong if we hadn't got involved with the scheme and this could have resulted in more damage and expense in the future so it has been really worthwhile.

"Sometimes it can be difficult to know who to contact to come into your house and do odd jobs so this is a really straightforward and simple way of getting home improvements done. I would recommend all Burngreave residents to find out more once they get the leaflet through – I phoned all my friends straight away and told them about it because we were so pleased!" she added.

But for Mercy and her husband their interest in DIY hasn't stopped there. Free DIY classes have been organised for people who have taken part in the scheme and have had all their work completed. The sessions cover a whole host of topics as Mercy explains:

"I decided to learn how to do plastering and I also took another class which taught me how to fit door locks. My husband got involved in plumbing but there were a wide range to pick from.

"I haven't had chance to put the plastering I learnt to good use yet, but I am planning to put a lock on the bathroom door so that's my next challenge!

"We both benefited from the courses, they were fun to take part in and we learnt a lot – we are planning to go to some more," she added.

Understanding ASBOs

The BNDfC Anti-Social
Behaviour Team has been
working to tackle the problems
caused by anti-social behaviour.
A major step has seen Anti
Social Behaviour Orders (ASBOs)
granted against two residents
in the Burngreave New Deal
area for the first time.

But applying for one is a last resort as Wendy Barlow, Team Leader of the Anti Social Behaviour Team, explains:

"We are constantly working with those concerned to look at ways of resolving any issues without going to court for an ASBO.

"This can involve keeping in regular contact with all the parties, using mediation or setting up a voluntary contract with individuals to help them change their behaviour. We work closely with a number of organisations such as MESH, the BNDfC Police Team, Family Support, Youth Offending Team and education agencies to see if we can contribute to bringing an end to unnecessary behaviour."

So, what actually is an ASBO?

An ASBO is an order that aims to stop certain behaviour. It can be obtained against anyone over ten and is brought through civil proceedings in a magistrates' court – a criminal offence is only committed if an ASBO is breached.

The ASBO will be made up of any number of prohibitions decided by the Magistrate based on the evidence. This could involve a curfew, a ban from entering certain grounds or buildings, not being allowed to associate with certain people or not engaging in any conduct which is likely to cause harassment, alarm or distress to others – and there are many more. Any prohibitions granted



against an individual will be for a minimum of two years or can be for life.

Says Wendy: "ASBOs are not a punishment. They are about boundary setting and are a tool to work with individuals to try and help them amend their behaviour.

"We do rely heavily on witness statements and other forms of evidence but when people come to us they have usually reached a certain point where they can no longer cope. Despite the daunting prospect, they are prepared to keep diaries or use video cameras. Witnesses have a dedicated support officer to provide all the support anyone may need."

Anti Social Behaviour means different things to different people but can range from serious acts of violence, harassment or drug related activities to more 'everyday' incidents such as noise nuisance or untidy/overgrown gardens.

Adds Wendy: "We believe everybody should be able to enjoy peace and quiet in their own home, feel safe and secure and not have to suffer

the anti social behaviour of others which can cause real misery.

"We are and will continue to do as much as possible to stop this behaviour in our community but we cannot do it on our own and work hard to build partnerships with local residents and other agencies."

The BNDfC Anti Social Behaviour Team is the only one of its kind in Sheffield to provide a one-to-one service overseeing the process from first complaint to resolution. They can help or advise any Burngreave resident who is suffering from anti social behaviour. The team can be contacted on 0114 203 9486 or at the Burngreave Housing Office on Spital Hill.



Did you know?

58 per cent of residents surveyed think that New Deal activities have improved the area by a fair amount or a great deal – an increase of 19 per cent since 2002.

I started using the JobNet service about eight months ago and I've now found a job through them. It's a great service because you can use phones and the internet and they'll help you with your CV. I'm very happy with the staff here – they've been fantastic.





JobNet @ Burngreave is leading the way in Sheffield for helping local people to access employment and training opportunities.

There are a number of JobNets across the city but JobNet @ Burngreave is highly regarded as one of the most successful... and it has the statistics to prove it!

Over a 21-month period since the service began in April 2003, a total of 343 people have accessed the service, 140 local residents have got a job, with 27 supported into training.

There are now hundreds of Burngreave residents registered as JobNet clients who are kept up-todate and advised when an employment opportunity comes up.

Tony Hall, Coordinator at JobNet @ Burngreave, said: "We are here to help Burngreave residents access any sort of employment and training. This could be by introducing them to actual job opportunities but also

giving expert advice on filling in application forms, CV writing or interview techniques."

There can be many reasons why it may be difficult for people in Burngreave to access work, from child care issues to language barriers, so the JobNet team often find themselves as a voice for the local community relaying these issues back to the professionals who can help to make a difference. The team also works closely with a number of other organisations and projects in the area to help overcome these problems.

Says Tony: "It is our second birthday this year and we are immensely proud of what we have achieved over this time, particularly the various relationship we have established with other organisations. We are now building for the future together and also looking at ways to develop the service even further... so watch this space!"

Brainy Backing

The 'IT-community school subject support project' based on Spital Lane received an extra special boost when Mastermind champion Shaun Wallace paid them a visit.

Shaun, winner of the 2004 BBC's Mastermind contest, dropped in to meet some youngsters who are involved in the project for a Q&A session in recognition of all their achievements.

The project, which aims to support underachieving Somali children from Burngreave by providing tutored teaching sessions every evening after school, has gone from strength-to-strength over recent years.



Did you know?

The percentage of residents who think Burngreave has got slightly or much better in the previous two years is up from

29 per cent to 58 per cent.

Residents who feel part of the community a fair amount or a great deal is up from 44 per cent in 2002 to 50 per cent in 2004.







The rest of the city was forced to sit up and take notice when the first ever Burngreave Business Awards became the talk of the town.

Competition was fierce and the awards ceremony itself became the centrepiece of a fantastic day of celebration.

After toasting the success of our area as a whole and all the thriving businesses that there are, there could be only four winners...

Time For You – a domestic cleaning service – scooped the HSBC sponsored Best Business Start-Up Award.

Meanwhile, innovative Stress Solutions picked up the Sheffield Chamber of Commerce sponsored Customer Service

Burngreave has a wealth of tasty eateries but for the times when you want to do it yourself Amy Plant at **Sheffield's 5-a-day project** gave us some nutritious and delicious recipes that are kind to the pocket too. **Enjoy!**

Lentil, cheese and carrot slice

225g (8oz) lentils 500ml (18floz) vegetable stock

A little oil

1 large onion - chopped

2 medium carrots - peeled and grated

110g (4oz) grated cheese

mixed herbs

1 egg (beaten)

25g (1oz) wholemeal breadcrumbs

Approximate cost: £3.27

A unique project which has been cooking up a healthy treat for Muslim elders is going from strength-to-strength.

The Halal Lunch Club provides nutritious food and social support for members of our Muslim community who are over 50. We spoke to Abdul Razak, coordinator of the project to find out more...

"The Halal Lunch Club has been running for just over a year now - the community approached BNDfC because, although there were a number of clubs for white and African Caribbean elders, we felt there was a gap in services for elderly Muslim people who wanted more to do to occupy their time. Now we have five lunches a week with approximately 15 people attending each one," says Abdul.

The sessions last for about three hours, giving people the opportunity to get together, enjoy a lovely, hot halal meal and also take part in a variety of activities.

"We aim to improve diet and physical health by providing healthy meals which are planned by a dietician and we use the activity sessions to promote healthy lifestyles and well-being and encourage moderate exercise.

"In addition, we also have English lessons, art and creative writing workshops and we can organise much needed support perhaps for those who require help understanding a letter or want welfare advice," he adds.

Although the lunch club has different sessions for Yemeni, Somali and Pakistani males and females, this is not exclusive and they welcome people to mix.

Savs Abdul: "I am particularly proud that we are helping to integrate the three communities together, especially when we organise day trips for everyone. This could be shopping in Bradford or a day out at the seaside we all have a great time!

"But I think our greatest success is that we have reached out to the most vulnerable and isolated people who have no extended family to look after them. It is these people particularly that the lunch club has made a real difference to."

Preheat the oven at 190°c/375°f/gas mark 5 and cook the lentils in a pan of water until soft and all the water has been absorbed.

In a separate pan, fry the onion until

Mix the remaining ingredients together and then add to the onions, along with the lentils. Stir and cook for 10 minutes.

Press into a 9 inch sandwich tin or similar shallow tin.

Bake in the oven for 30 minutes. Cut into slices – can be eaten hot or cold.

Quick homemade pizza

225g (8oz) self-raising flour 50g (2oz) margarine salt

enough milk to make a soft dough

Toppings (most of these are optional or can be changed)

tinned tomatoes, tomato puree, grated cheese, herbs, tuna, ham, sliced tomatoes, mushrooms, sweetcorn,

> Approximate cost including listed toppings: £3.72

Mix together the flour and the salt and then rub in the margarine. Gradually add milk until the mixture holds together all in one piece. Roll out to required size and thickness and place on a baking tray.

Cut or mash up the lumps in the tinned tomatoes and spread over the base.

Add any or all of the suggested toppings and then cover with the cheese.

Bake for 25 minutes until the cheese has melted and the base is firm at 220°c/425°f/gas mark 7.


